always found time to take part and help in every activity the group did with his daughter Karen helping as well. Robert contributed to all the discussions, attending every committee meeting, plus helping at public meetings and events.

"He had a very dry wit and lovely years. He supported the group in sense of humour that was always present in everything he said and did. We will all miss his enthusiasm, support and sage advice.

Robert was a hero, a committed member, a loving father and a dear friend. He will be greatly missed by all of us."

Robert, a retired accountant, took part in yoga, walking and the healthy

food programme that the group ran locally. He was sociable and loved playing

Bridge and sailing Heron dinghies well into his retirement. He was also active in his local Church.
